

Emergency Shelter

Maison du Père is for emergencies only.



In 2018, the Shelter's beds represented only 35 % of the housing services provided by Maison du Père. We are offering other solutions as well.

65% of its users are in a social reintegration or housing stabilization program.



In 2018, 621 men stayed at Maison du Père shelter for the first time.

The emergency housing service welcomes homeless men, listens to them and proposes various public and community programs to help them with their social reintegration. 1,700 men have come through its doors this year.

A happy ending to homelessness – It is possible!



In-home Assistance

They do not want to change.



Since 2015, thanks to a federal grant, Maison du Père has overseen Projet Logement Montréal*. The goal of this project was to place 250 chronically homeless people in private lodgings within 36 months, and provide them with psychosocial support. The goal was reached after only 27 months, and the in-home stability rate for the project sits at 93%.


It is possible!

The provincial government recognized Projet Logement Montréal's excellent results and, in March 2018, provided it with the necessary financial support to find lodging and provide in-home assistance for an additional 178 individuals in the Montreal area.

Projet Logement Montréal is only one part of Maison du Père's in-home assistance service, as 150 another men are regularly visited in their homes due to their unstable situation.

Stable housing with support is prouving to be an integrated care solution that prevents recurring homelessness.

^{*} Projet Logement Montréal regroups Montreal's 4 largest homeless organizations : Maison du Père, Accueil Bonneau, Welcome Hall Mission and Old Brewery Mission. This is the largest SRA project (Stabilité Résidentielle avec Accompagnement) in Canada.



Residence for homeless seniors

Fifty-five years is young to be living in residence.



But living on the streets ages you prematurely.

At Maison du Père, aging is not a sign of years, but a sign of vulnerability. Many of the men we support show signs of chronic illnesses or cognitive disorders that are usually seen in people who are, on average, 10 years older*.

They chose to live this way.



Our statistics show that, for some years now, an increasing number of men end up on the streets for the first time at an older age.

In 1998: 22.3 % of men at the Shelter were aged 50 and over;

In 2018: 70%

Men who are between 55 and 64 and do not have a workplace pension plan are the most likely to find themselves in a highly precarious situation.

- Some are unable to work due to health concerns but are too young to claim their public pension.
- Others are fit to work but are discriminated against because of their age. They cannot claim pension-related benefits nor disability benefits.

Community Healthcare

You're losing sight of your mission.

FALSE

Community health care services allow us to reach people who would normally not access the conventional health care system because of the discrimination they experience.

Lack of proper care can then lead to deteriorating health conditions and repeated hospitalizations, sometimes for the same issue.


Maison du Père's clinical team does not limit itself to treating medical emergencies. It takes a holistic approach, examining the patients needs in light of their disaffiliated situation.

Our intervention and clinical staff brings hope to discouraged men through dialogue and by helping them access the public network. They show them that public services can be accessible and helpful.

Maison du Père's convalescent care service is also a social reintegration opportunity for many. Over the past year, 44% of men who used the convalescent care service chose to join a program adapted to their needs to avoid going back on the street.









We are part of the Health and Social Services Network. We offer complementary, integrated services.

Many partnerships were created over the last five years:

- A CLSC nurse is at the Shelter three days a week;
- A CIUSSS resident doctor visits every two weeks.

The service exchange goes both ways, as 40% of our convalescent care beds are occupied by men referred by Montreal hospitals: CIUSSS de l'Est, Hôpital du Sacré-Cœur, CHUM, Hôpital Notre-Dame, Montreal General Hospital, Hôpital de Verdun, etc.

Since its creation, 385 people have used Maison du Père's convalescent care service, for a total of 10,615 overnight stays.

Public and community collaboration: it is possible and good for everyone!

Palliative Care for Homeless Men

" It is a way of letting them know that they will not die alone, forgotten and uncared for, that they can count on us until the end..."

Maison du Père's palliative services provide comfort and hygienic care to our Residence's homeless men and seniors to give them a better quality of life.

Medical monitoring is provided by the Palliative Home-Care Society of Greater Montreal, which has been active in this field for over 40 years. Their mission: "to enable all persons in the advanced stages of cancer or other life-limiting illness to remain in their home as long as possible, close to their loved ones, and conclude the final chapter of their life there."

The palliative care rooms at Maison du Père make it possible for residents to remain in their normal environment as long as possible, surrounded by their caring ones (employees, volunteers, peers) and to die with peace and dignity, like all Canadians.



Jocelyne, Volunteer

Before...

I started volunteering at Maison du Père six years ago. I barely knew anything about homeless people. I thought they were all alcoholics or mentally disabled.

After

After volunteering for a few weeks, I saw them in a completely different light. I learned about these men, who had had a hard life. Men who wanted to get off the streets.

When I mention Maison du Père to friends or relatives, they always comment: "You amaze mel I do not know how you do it!"

My answer is simple. I tell them that volunteering makes me feel good and that if I helped at least one person that day, by listening or doing anything else, it makes my day!

Maison du Père has changed my life. I have become more patient, more tolerant, and a better listener.

Social Reintegration

The men become dependent on your services.



Maison du Père's social reintegration services offer various programs to homeless men to help them regain their autonomy in all aspects of their lives: financially, professionally, academically, legally, psychosocially, etc.

Each participant identifies the skills he needs to re-acquire and issues he needs to resolve to regain control of his life.

Services are made possible thanks to relationships we have developed with several community and government partners: Clinique Droits Devant, Destination Emploi, SARCA, Au/lab, Travail sans-frontières, Emploi-Québec, etc.

In 2017, 73 % of our participants had accomplished their goals when they left the program.

Regard collectif

Since August 2017, a professor from Université de Montréal's School of Optometry and his students have visited the Maison every two weeks to provide full eye examinations and high-quality glasses. A key Maison du Père worker is in charge of recruiting patients and creating bonds of trust with the optometry team.

This past year's results have shown that our disaffiliated users truly needed this:

- 100 full eye examinations;
- 96 glasses ordered and delivered;
- 17 medical or ophthalmology referrals.*



Argon

Over the past year, Maison du Père has been trying out a new intervention method with Argon, our first service dog trained by the Mira Foundation to improve the well-being of homeless people. The dog defuses crises and encourages discussions between users.

Our support dog has carried out over **750 interventions**.

The Trinitarians have managed Maison du Père for more than 30 years. Though it is currently under secular direction, they continue to play an important role within the organization, providing moral and spiritual support to the impoverished men, whatever their religion.

The residents and men in our Shelter are invited to celebrate mass every evening at Maison du Père's chapel. Trinitarian members also visit prisons and hospitals, in order to bring hope and comfort to the homeless men.

They provide end-of-life spiritual support to ensure that each man passes serenely and with dignity. In 2018, they held funeral services for 32 homeless men.

Maison du Père's Foundation was created in 2005 to exclusively support Maison du Père's activities and to ensure its sustainability. Over the past few years, its teams have spent a great deal of energy to form alliances and create events collecting the necessary funds to develop the innovative services meeting to the needs of its users.

Solicitation by mail

A large part of our foundation funds come from donations received by way of our mailouts, including three newsletters. We believe it is important to raise awareness in the community about homelessness, combat the prejudices associated with it and demonstrate our donors the scope of our actions toward the least fortunate.

Casual Ball

Since 2008, Maison du Père's Foundation has held a fundraising event each spring, bringing together business people from different backgrounds. We would like to thank Mr. DeSerres, CEO of DeSerres, for his involvement as Honorary Chair of the 11th edition of the Casual Ball, held on April 28th, 2018. Thanks also to Tammy Verge and Antoine Vézina for hosting the event.

Legacy Gift

The legacy gift is also a significant source of income for Maison du Père's Foundation. More and more donors are choosing to leave a fixed amount, a percentage or the residue of their property. Through this gesture of solidarity, they immortalize their support for the work Maison du Père does with the homeless, without affecting their personal financial situation.

Dedicated donations

An increasing number of donors, businesses and institutions want to support a specific project, through a single donation or over an extended period.



Before...

I did not know much about homelessness and I had a very reductive view of it. I thought that it was people's own fault if they were homeless and that they could get out of the street if they tried. It seemed to me that there were many easily accessible resources available to help them, and that they remained homeless because they were not motivated enough. I put a lot distance between myself and them, believing that we were very different, probably because I was afraid of the unknown.

After

Helping these men has given me a completely different perspective. I have met men who are like me, and who have faced unimaginable challenges. I respect their strength and resilience enormously. Today, I see how hard it can be to get off the streets, as I have witnessed organizational obstacles, the lack of resources and how little empathy they receive. I've witnessed the consequences that plague them, and I am proud of being able to help improve their quality of life. I now see the individual rather than the homeless, and I have made it my personal duty to share my experience with those who have not had the chance to spend time with these men.



2018-2019 Goals

- Investigate potential ways to expand our homeless senior housing with services adapted to their specific needs;
- 2. Develop clinical services for homeless people (average age of 56) with the addition of a geriatric assessment and reaffiliation wing for homeless people, in collaboration with the health and social services network;
- Deploy palliative care services for people who are or have been homeless;
- 4. Investigate potential ways to expand our housing for our social and occupational reintegration program with services adapted to the specific needs of homeless veterans and of homeless men aged 50 to 55 with work reintegration issues;
- 5. Develop phase 3 of Projet Logement Montréal which aims to house and provide assistance to another 250 or more chronically homeless people;
- **6.** Develop partnerships for donations of food, personal care products and various equipment;
- 7. Prepare activities for Maison du Père's 50th anniversary, including the launch of a major fundraising campaign;
- 8. Provide ongoing training for social workers and support staff.
